Coordinator's Message BANKSTOWN PRIMARY

What began as a happy and normal school year, unexpectedly and rapidly changed during the Term 2 holidays. The initial lockdown was a challenge for students, parents and teachers. Our school community coped amazingly well, with everyone banding together to ensure learning at Al Amanah College Bankstown continued despite having to do this remotely. Teachers worked to provide quality learning experiences for our students and supported their learning online from home. I have been amazed by the flexibility, tenacity, and creativity that our students have shown as they have navigated this new and different way of accessing their education. With the aid of technology, we continued to participate and celebrate events such as Book Week, Science Week and Fruit and Veg Month. Students were able to interact with their friends and teachers through daily Microsoft Teams sessions. They were active during their sports sessions with Mr Krayem and supported by our Learning Support team through the implementation of the Reading Tutor Program and MiniLit.

There is no doubt that the use of technology in education is a powerful tool. Our teachers use information technology through online resources, multimedia assessments, learning videos, and digital games on Mathletics. Our school's computer lab received an upgrade this year, with new computers installed, an improvement in the school internet service, and a new class set of iPads. This upgrade of technology will enhance student engagement in their learning and create a richer learning environment.



This year, we have continued to implement the InitiaLit program in Kindergarten, and for the first time in our Year 1 classes. The results of this program have already proven very successful, with many students reading at levels above the expected grade level. The InitiaLit program is aimed at students in grades Kindergarten - Year 2 and targets teaching synthetic phonics alongside rich literature. The program also targets the development of vocabulary, which remains a school focus this year. Vocabulary is an important focal point of literacy, teaching as the development of a rich vocabulary allows students to comprehend and construct increasingly complex texts as well as engage in oral language for a variety of social purposes.

Last year, the teachers worked diligently to write explicit mathematics programs. This year, these programs were implemented with teachers using the explicit teaching method of 'I Do', 'We Do' and 'You Do'. Teachers utilise a variety of engagement strategies and clearly show students, in small steps, what to do and how to do it through physical demonstration. The teacher also periodically checks for student understanding. The implementation of these programs has been very successful, with student results in weekly assessments showing an increase in applying their learning through written tests.

We welcomed back several staff members this year, including Mrs Awada, Mrs Nachar and Mrs Zahra and also bade farewell to both Mr Nachar and Mr Sinwan. We were pleased to see Mr Krayem take on the role as head of the Welfare Committee and wished Mrs Al Sheikh all the best as she welcomed a new baby in Term 3.

Finally, I would like to thank all that have been involved in making this another successful, albeit unusual year from school leaders to teachers, ancillary staff to parents, and all our students. I would like to wish our 2021 Year 6 students the very best in the next step of their lives and hope that they continue to thrive in their love of learning. I look forward to beginning a new year with new additions and working with our fantastic team at Al Amanah College Bankstown. Wishing everyone a safe and relaxing summer holiday.

As we approach the end of the year, we reflect and say Al Hamdulillah for all the hardships and challenges we have come across in 2021. It hasn't been easy being in lockdown for half of the year. This year has been a difficult year for parents, students, and teachers with online learning, however, I think given the circumstances, teachers and parents worked well together to ensure that students adapted well to online learning. I would like to acknowledge and thank parents for their effort and dedication during this time. We had many parents trying to assist more than one child at home and work from home at the same time. Although we focused on preventing student academic regression during online learning, our main concern was student wellbeing. Towards the end of Term 3, we started wellbeing classes which were very popular amongst the students. Thank you, Mr Taiba, for your great enthusiasm! Weekly assemblies were conducted to acknowledge the achievers for the week. Sheikh Imam Mohammad Halabi presented a short religion lesson to students, which gave a feeling of normality to online learning. Teachers were putting in extra time to think of engaging strategies to motivate students to learn online by having cooking competitions, fun quizzes online and, art and craft activities.

As we go back to face to face teaching, parents might be concerned about their child's academic level. Class teachers will undertake assessments to identify strengths and areas of improvement for all students. This will help inform their planning and programming.

This year we have been fortunate to receive funding to be part of the COVID Intensive Support Program. The purpose of the COVID Intensive Learning Support Program is to deliver targeted and intensive small group tuition to identified students in primary, with a priority for literacy and numeracy. Funds were used to employ additional support staff to work with small groups 3 times a week for 30- minute sessions over a 20-week period. During online learning, we continued to run these sessions on Microsoft Teams. The sessions have been effective because there is a strong emphasis on monitoring student progress and working on areas of concern.

On a final note, I would like to wish our Year 6 students all the best for high school. A special thank you to our lovely primary teachers for their hard work this year. They adapted well to online learning and did a remarkable job with their students. I wish all students and their families a lovely holiday and I look forward to seeing you in 2022. May Allah protect you and keep you safe.

Our Library

Al Amanah Library continually plays an important role in realising the School's goals and initiatives through its vision in pursuing academic excellence by providing quality curriculum, resources, excellent services, and support to library patrons. InitialiLit and class library programs have been introduced for early primary K-2 students, to improve both literature and information literacy skills, in addition to their home reader sessions. Collection development is one of the key areas the library is focusing on. We provide a variety of genres and incorporate award winning popular fiction, and non-fiction titles to supplement the literature needs of our students.

This year proves to be the most challenging time for our students as their ability to borrow books has been limited. During these times, we are continually improving the library area which includes organising some of the resources for a more efficient system. The library has been renovated to a more vibrant and inviting look that provides a more welcoming ambience for library patrons. Other than a place for holding Home Reader sessions, the library space is also used for learning support lessons, recreational reading, interactive storytelling and other activities during recess and lunch breaks. The library is also a place for private study and small group discussions for high school students.

We have also encouraged students in completing their PRC 2021 by assisting them in updating their student records. 





Online / Home Learning




















Clean Up Australia Day

Year One has had an astounding year filled with many enjoyable activities. Throughout the year, students have been involved in various events such as The Biggest Morning Tea, Science Week, Book Week, Israa and Miraj, Eid celebrations and festivals.

Year One began the year immersing themselves in the field of entomology. Throughout Term One, students were given the exciting task of investigating a wide range of insects, their behaviour and environment. They learnt about composting and recycling, focusing on observing worms and recycling their scraps to create compost for the school garden. They were able to have practical experiences in handling and observing insects through their hands-on Sydney Zoo incursion.

In Term Two, students explored bubbles in our science unit 'Brilliant Bubbles'. They had an exhilarating time during their Fizzics incursion exploring mixtures. They created gigantic bubbles and made tasty sherbet witnessing that certain ingredients can be combined to create a reaction. They also made some green slime and learnt how to follow a procedure.

In Term Three, students applied their inquisitive skills to identify differences and similarities of daily living in the past and present. Students took a virtual tour back in time to school in the 1880's. In addition, students explored various artistic styles of three famous artists; Monet, Van Gogh and Picasso. They were able to appreciate artworks such as 'Reflections' and 'Starry Night' by exploring different techniques used by the artists. Students then made a mark on paintings of their own take of these famous paintings.

In Term Four, students explored the different types of weather we have throughout the year and how they change during the four seasons. They had an exciting time investigating the concept that different places have different weather patterns and explored how activities in areas vary according to the weather. They continued to develop their skills through exploring the elements of rhythm, tempo, and pitch. They improvised with sounds and simple rhythm and pitch patterns to create musical sounds.

It has been an incredible journey, and we are very proud of each of you and your hard work during online learning to become tech-savvy students. We have shared many wonderful memories and lots of exciting learning.





Learning Support

Al Amanah College places a high priority on meeting the individual and unique needs of all students. During 2021, the Learning Support Department has worked closely with the Curriculum Committee, Welfare Committee, classroom teachers, students, and members of the school community to create learning environments appropriate for the entire range of student abilities. This includes providing reasonable adjustments to the student's learning programs and their learning environment to enable their access and participation on the same basis as other students. In addition, older, low progress readers are given the opportunity to partake in explicit and systematic reading intervention programs - MacqLit and MultiLit. Younger low progress readers are involved in the MiniLit program. MiniLit is an evidence-based, explicit and effective early literacy intervention programme conducted 3 days a week for 45-minute sessions.

The COVID-19 pandemic presented a unique challenge to the Learning Support Department that involved providing support to students from afar. Learning Support Staff were quick to adapt individualised support in a way that was accessible to students through the online platform Microsoft Teams. Over the course of the Online Learning Period, support staff were involved in supporting students' social and emotional wellbeing through frequent check-ins with students and follow up calls with their families. Some Learning Support students found it challenging to adjust to online learning given the absence of face-to-face support from teachers. However, it was interesting to see the positive effect of remote learning and its ability amplify the adjustments teachers could make to support students. Overall, the Learning Support Department was proud to have supported students through online learning.

The Learning Support team is dedicated to helping each student to achieve his/her individual potential. The provision of an inclusive curriculum is integral to this commitment. As always, the team is available to consult with parents and guardians for resources about learning differences, including referrals to outside professionals and academic support.

COVID-19 INTENSIVE LEARNING SUPPORT PROGRAM

In 2021, Al Amanah College was nominated by the NSW Department of Education to participate in the COVID Intensive Learning Support Program. As part of the program, small group tuition involving supplementary teaching and learning support for groups of 2-5 students was given to 150 students. The Intensive Learning Support Program began running during school hours in Term 2. Students were given three half-an-hour sessions per week of small group instruction to help them develop their literacy and numeracy skills.

With the closure of schools in Term 3 and the introduction of online learning, ILSP staff worked tirelessly to adapt their timetable and lessons to the online learning platform 'Microsoft Teams' and the program went ahead smoothly providing students with additional support during times they needed it most. The school has received outstanding feedback from parents and students about the its efforts to keep this program running during the lockdown as students received this beneficial support from their teachers whilst learning from home. Al Amanah College would like to extend its gratitude to the NSW Government for their generosity.


Y12 Business Studies experience: Halima Zahab

Stage 5 Commerce



The Technology and Applied Studies (TAS) faculty utilises both traditional and industry standard technologies to provide students with opportunities to engage in innovative practical design activities.

TAS electives at stage 5 and 6 provide the opportunities for students through inquiry learning to complete practical projects that are both challenging and rewarding. These allow students to develop sound practical skills to solve real life problems and prepare students to be lifelong learners.

The rapid rate of technological change in an increasingly knowledge-based society highlights the need for flexible technological capability, innovative thinking and effective communication skills. Vital life skills such as teamwork, communication, time management and organisational skills underpin all Technology and Applied Studies design projects. As students progress through the years they are given greater autonomy to select design briefs thus developing responsibility, maturity and motivation.

The TAS faculty offers the widest range of subjects on offer at Al Amanah College. Courses in TAS include Stage 4 Technology (mandatory), Food Technology, Design and Technology, Graphics Technology, Industrial Technology, Timber products and furniture Technologies, Information Processes and Technology, Information software technologies, Software Design and Development, iSTEM, Visual arts, and Music.

We have Five teachers in the Faculty:

Mr. Mallitt (Music, IST and ICT), Mr. Darwich (Technology Mandatory and Food technology), Mrs. Slater (Technology and iSTEM), Mrs. Najafi (V Arts), and Mr. Kumar (Graphics Technology, Timber Technology and Industrial Technology). We are fortunate to have Mr. Darwich and Mrs. Slater in our Faculty and are grateful for their high level of commitment to the TAS faculty goals.

All members of the TAS faculty have worked effectively as a team to provide stimulating and exciting learning opportunities for our students, especially during the pandemic. A variety of online teaching and learning strategies have been effectively used to engage students and provide quality learning opportunities. Teachers have responded well to school-wide initiatives in improving literacy and numeracy, and have adhered to faculty expectations and goals. Teachers not only delivered the specialist curriculum, but integrated literacy (through R2L and Literacy target) and numeracy in their lessons. Teachers also embraced the initiative in vocabulary development by implementing teaching and learning strategies in vocabulary. Technology (Stage 4)



Learning Support



Al Amanah College places a high priority on meeting the individual and unique needs of all students. In 2021, the Learning Support Department has worked closely with the Curriculum Committee, Welfare Committee, classroom teachers, students, and members of the school community to create learning environments appropriate for the entire range of student abilities. This includes providing reasonable adjustments to the student's learning programs and their learning environment to enable their access and participation on the same basis as other students. In addition, older, low progress readers are given the opportunity to partake in explicit and systematic reading intervention programs MacqLit and MultiLit one-on-one. Younger, low progress readers are involved in the MiniLit program. MiniLit is an evidence- based, explicit, and effective early literacy intervention programme conducted 3 days a week for 45-minute sessions.

The COVID-19 pandemic presented a unique challenge to the Learning Support Department that involved providing support to students from afar. Learning Support Staff were quick to adapt individualised support in a way that was accessible to students through the online platform Microsoft Teams. Over the course of the Online

Learning Period, Support staff were involved in supporting students' social and emotional wellbeing through frequent check-ins with students and follow up calls with their families. Some Learning Support students found it challenging to adjust to online learning given the absence of face-to-face support from teachers; for others it was interesting to see the positive effect of remote learning and its ability amplify the adjustments teachers could make to support them. Overall, the Learning Support Department was proud to have supported students through online learning.

The Learning Support team is dedicated to helping each student to achieve his/her individual potential. The provision of inclusive curriculum is integral to this commitment. As always, the team is available to consult with parents and guardians for resources about learning differences, including referrals to outside professionals and academic support.

COVID-19 Intensive Learning Support Program

This year, Al Amanah College Liverpool Campus was selected by the NSW Department of Education to partake in the COVID Intensive Learning Support Program. The Intensive Learning Support Program catered for students from K-12, aiming to improve their skillset in English and Mathematics. As part of this initiative, the school hired additional educators to deliver small group tuition for students who need it most.

In Term 2, students attended two sessions, three times per week on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays during after school hours. In Term 3, with the closure of schools due to the COVID-19 pandemic, this schedule continued on the online platform Microsoft Teams. Educators were quick to adapt their sessions to ensure lessons were engaging and suitable to the online learning context, including incorporating interactive games, such as Kahoot and Socrative, to enhance student engagement. Students found these sessions very beneficial, particularly at a time where they were learning from home and required additional support. Ultimately, the program has been a great success as it has had a positive impact on student learning.
