Bankstown Primary COORDINATOR MESSAGE

'The more that you read, the more things you will know, the more that you learn, the more places you'll go.'This quote from Dr Seuss's book', I Can Read With My Eyes Shut', has always been a favourite of mine. It emphasises the importance of reading, and that reading is the key to success. As teachers, we know the many benefits of reading, including comprehension development, vocabulary expansion, strengthening of writing abilities, and increasing imagination and creativity. Literature is highlighted in the new K-2 English syllabus as essential in developing core knowledge of the subject of English. Listening to and using literature can foster an understanding, appreciation, and love of reading.

The release of the new K-2 English syllabus is due to be implemented in 2023, along with the new K-2 Mathematics syllabus. The new evidence-based curriculum prioritises the basics and will ensure students develop strong foundations in Literacy and Numeracy. The curriculum is more explicit in the direction of what Kindergarten to Year 2 students need to be taught. Our teachers have been participating in a variety of professional learning opportunities, both face-to-face and online, as well as collaborating with K-2 teachers from the Liverpool campus to design teaching and learning programs. We are very excited to begin this new chapter in the curriculum reform.

This year saw a return to a 'normal' school year, without the restrictions we had to endure during 2020 and 2021. Students were able to once again participate in a variety of excursions and incursions as well as the Years 5 & 6 Gala Day, interschool Public Speaking competition, and the Annual Year 6 Maths Cup. This year, we were also selected to be involved in the NSW Government funding Intensive Learning Support Program to assist students who were impacted by the disruptions of the COVID-19 pandemic, with an aim to reinforce classroom instruction through small group tuition tailored to students' learning, focusing on literacy and numeracy.

This year, we introduced laptops for our Stage 3 students to facilitate learning. The benefits of using laptops in the classroom include lifting student achievement, enhancing engagement and enthusiasm in students, and promotes 21st-century learning, such as technological proficiency. Students have been using their laptops both at school and home to complete tasks, such as research, keyboard skills, assessment tasks, and checking for understanding through programs such as Kahoots. The Year 5 students were able to use their laptops to complete NAPLAN Online this year.

NAPLAN Online was successfully conducted during Term 2 this year. Online NAPLAN tests provide more precise results and are more engaging for students. One of the main benefits is tailored (or adaptive) testing, where the test presents questions that may be more or less difficult depending on student responses. We continue to use NAPLAN results to identify strengths and areas of need to improve teaching programs and to set goals in literacy and numeracy. Once again, results were pleasing this year, with some students achieving results in the top 2 bands across all domains. Next year, NAPLAN test dates will be moved to Term 1. This change allows teachers to see results earlier and therefore allows for more targeted support for students to ensure they are gaining essential literacy and numeracy skills.

Finally, I would like to thank all that have been involved in making this another successful year, from school leaders to teachers, ancillary staff to parents, and all our students. I would like to wish our 2022 Year 6 students the very best in the next step in their lives, and hope that they continue to thrive in their love of learning. I look forward to beginning a new year with new additions and working with our fantastic team at Al Amanah College Bankstown. Wishing everyone a safe and relaxing summer holiday.

As the school year comes to an end, I would like to thank teachers, parents, and students for a successful year. This year, many events took place as we return to normal activities from Covid. Many excursions, incursions, and events were organised such as World of Maths, Science Fizzics and Book Week.

During Book Week, additional activities were conducted in the classroom, and students were able to participate in the Library Book Week Competition. A workshop was held to assist parents help their child with reading at home. There was a good turnout at the workshop, and we hope many parents benefitted from the suggestions and advice provided. This year's addition to school events were the Islamic Competitions. It was excellent to see many students participating in the competition and we are very proud of their achievements. In addition to our school events, our prime focus in primary school is to make sure students are happy and comfortable at school in an Islamic environment, and to provide them with support and encouragement to reach their full potential. The focus of our school strategic plan is to implement engaging lessons and to maximise student learning and growth in the areas of English and Mathematics. The focus for English in the younger years is to implement the K-2 English program, InitiaLit, which provides students with the essential core knowledge and foundation skills to become successful readers and writers. As part of the InitiaLit programme, regular assessments are conducted to identify student needs. Moreover, we have been very fortunate to have more teacher aides in the classroom to help maximise learning time, particularly with students who have learning needs and challenges.

Many of our teaching programs have been changed to integrate an explicit teaching model to enable students to have a clear understanding of why they are learning something, how it connects to what they already know, what is expected of them, and how to do it. Students are given opportunities to ask questions and receive clear feedback about their performance against learning outcomes.

In 2022, the new K-2 English and Mathematics Syllabus was released and will need to be implemented next year. This year, our K-2 staff have been working closely with teachers from our mother campus, Al Amanah Bankstown, to update our programmes to link to the new syllabus. There is a stronger emphasis on building the foundational skills in the new syllabus documents.

Finally, I would like to thank all the primary staff for their dedication and hard work. Your work doesn't go unnoticed, and we appreciate your effort and commitment to our students. A special thank you to our Coordinators, Mr Sabbagh and Mr Halabi for working closely with the Arabic department, and to our stage leaders, Mrs Khalil, Mrs Huseincehajic, and Mr Jamleoui, who work regularly with the class teachers to ensure good teaching practices are implemented in the classroom.

- · Working with the SRC on special occasions, events, ceremonies, and functions. Very limited this year due to pandemic lock downs.

Our aim hasn't changed which is to engage staff, students, and parents in positive reflection, learning, and development of their Islamic faith through a combination of formal and informal teaching and learning opportunities. We are also in the prevention and rescue business. We help students find a better way to deal with issues ranging from family breakdown and loneliness, to stress and anxiety. The Imam also has a responsibility to create awareness amongst staff, parents, and children from the wrong teachings and extreme views that are tarnishing our beautiful religion, Islam. 

Welfare Committee

Student welfare is imperative to all staff at Al Amanah College Bankstown Campus. This year we stressed the importance of encouraging and fostering positive attitudes and behaviours. The welfare team focused on providing assistance to children who had been identified as facing difficulties either at home or at school; academic, emotional, physical or social. The assistance of Breakthru, who ran individual and group sessions in school, targeting a number of key social/emotional issues faced by students at the school, allowed students to work on building positive friendships, emotional regulation, turn taking, and other key social and emotional skills.

The five prayers are among the best acts of worship that the Muslim performs. Performing them is the best deed after having the correct belief in God and His Messenger. Prophet Muhammad, may Allah raise his rank, was asked what the best deed was, and he said it was performing the obligatory prayers at the beginning of their times. Students across Year 2 to Year 6 partook in daily Congregational Dhuhr Prayer. During these sessions, students were taught the Poetry of Imam Abdul Ghaniyy Al Nabbulsiy Muqtadah Al Shahadatayn (The Two Testifications of Faith) (مُقتفَى الشهادتين). Ten students were chosen across the cohort as winners for successfully reciting off by heart and were awarded a Lenovo Tablet.

The Welfare Committee worked with the SRC team to promote National Day Against Bullying and Violence. On Friday, 18 March, Al Amanah College held a special assembly and discussed the definition of bullying and how to combat these situations with skills and strategies. Students were reminded of our Islamic values and how we should treat each other the way we would like to be treated. Students participated in a range of activities, including creating colour posters with slogans that focused on Al Amanah's stance against bullying.

Schools are among the safest places in the community for children and young people. Al Amanah College Bankstown applies a universal and multi-faceted whole-school approach to safety and wellbeing. On Tuesday 8 February, marking Safe Internet Day, our welfare coordinator Mr Krayem organised an anti-bullying incursion and cyber safety program. This incursion provided simple strategies for Stage 3 students to develop positive and healthy friendships. A successful and fun-filled event ensured students from Years 5 to 6 walked away well equipped with new anti-bullying strategies, followed by a breakfast with the school principal.

Al Amanah College focused on improving the health and wellbeing of students in 2022 with the addition of the life skills team. The in-school program in Term 4, run by the team, focused on improving students' concentration, communication, listening, resilience, confidence, and self-regulation skills, along with cultivating students' balance, spatial awareness and motor skills. The life skills team stresses on a number of values instilled within the program, from Respect, Honesty, Perseverance, Resilience, and Compassion.

2022 witnessed the welfare team acquiring K-6 student journals and wellbeing books to further strengthen positive wellbeing at our school. My Wellbeing Journals/Teacher Manuals encourage students to express their feelings, fears, goals, challenges and opinions. The series ensured students had opportunities to reflect on their lives in a rational way.
















Learning Support

It has been an energetic and productive year for the Learning Support Department, as we continue to implement a range of intervention programs to benefit the students at our school. We aim to meet the individual and unique needs of all our students, in a harmonious and motivating learning environment.

This year, Al Amanah College Bankstown was delighted to be nominated by the NSW Department of Education, to participate in the COVID Intensive Learning Support Program. As part of the Program, 75 students were selected to take part in small group tuition, involving supplementary teaching. The Program commenced during school hours in Term 1, where students were given three half-an-hour sessions per week of small group instruction, to help them develop their literacy and numeracy skills.

In addition, our low progress readers were involved in the systematic, explicit MULTILIT programs; MiniLit, The Reading Tutor Program and MacqLit. These programs focus on phonics, sight word recognition, and supported reading, to assist our struggling learners to acquire the foundations in becoming independent readers. We are pleased that the execution of these programs has resulted in successful student outcomes.

Overall, the Learning Support team proudly encourages and supports students with additional needs and strives to cater for their learning. We are proud of our students' achievements and look forward to another exciting year in 2023.

The initiative focuses on supporting primary school students transitioning from a school-based sporting program, to participating at their local sporting club, building relationships, and fostering growth. Thank you to the specialist coaches from Bankstown Bruins Basketball and the Bulldogs NRL Development team for running the initiatives with our students. This year we were delighted to have successfully raised the level of physical activity across all age groups after being restricted due to the pandemic in 2021.

Welfare Committee 2022 REPORT

The Welfare Committee at Al Amanah College is committed to providing a safe, supportive, and responsive learning environment for everyone. The team works collaboratively to support the learning, wellbeing, and safety of all students.

Good discipline is fundamental and the collaboration between staff and students is essential to maintaining positive student behaviour and an effective school.

Our school community works together to provide quality learning environments which are inclusive, safe and secure. Standards of behaviour include our expectations, which are: Be Safe Be Respectful, Be Responsible, Be There, Be Ready and Follow Directions.

Guided by these rules, we implement teaching and learning a proaches to support the development of skills needed by students to meet our high standards for safe, respectful, and engaged behaviour.

One of our objectives is to help promote a safe and happy school environment. During Term 3, a social skills program was introduced to cater for students in the lower primary school. A group of students met each week, supervised by a welfare team delegate to participate in fun group activities. These activities aimed to promote valuable skills such as, fair play, following rules, and interacting with others in a respectful way. Discussion and reflection were an important aspect of each session. Students also enjoyed role play, social stories, co-operation games, and small sided group matches.

The Hadith of the Week is a monitoring program that promotes the school's ethos. It is introduced and followed every morning during the primary school assembly and then elaborated on during prayer time. This will continue to foster the Islamic values amongst the students, and implement them within the community.

Our aim for next year is to continue to implement and maintain a positive and safe school environment.

Learning Support

In 2022, Al Amanah College was nominated by the NSW Department of Education to participate in the COVID Intensive Learning Support Program (ILSP) from Years 1 to 12. Small group tuition involving supplementary teaching and learning support was given to 5 students from each class. Students were given three sessions per week to help develop their literacy and numeracy skills.

Al Amanah College is committed to meeting the individual and unique needs of all students, in order to improve student wellbeing and achievement in a safe and supportive environment. In 2022, the Learning Support Department has worked closely with the Curriculum Committee, Welfare Committee, classroom teachers, on-site Speech Pathologist, students and members of the school community, to facilitate learning environments that enable students to reach their full potential. This year, a range of programs were implemented including the MultiLit program, ILSP program, in-class support sessions and the use of Individual Student Learner Profiles differentiation.

The MultiLit program is an evidence- based, explicit, and effective early literacy intervention program for low progress readers conducted 4 days a week for 45-minute sessions. Students are given the opportunity to partake in explicit and systematic reading intervention programs, which include MacqLit for older readers and MiniLit for younger readers.

Class teachers and the learning support team work together to implement an effective plan, so students are able to receive the utmost support and benefit. Students receive up to three in-class support sessions per week, with a focus on guided reading, literacy, and numeracy.

The provision of inclusive curriculum is integral to this commitment. As always, the team is available to consult with parents and guardians for resources about learning differences, including referrals to outside professionals and academic support. This includes providing reasonable adjustments to the student's learning programs and their learning environment to enable their access and participation on the same basis of their peers.


Our Year 7 and 8 cohorts have been delving deep into a variety of texts and exploring new concepts and ideas! Students have been studying units such as Heroes Journeys Through Film, Crime, Poetry, Identity, Novel Studies and finally Visual Representations. Year 7 and 8 have grown to share great perspectives in class, discussing many different viewpoints and ideas. Through our different units studied, Year 7 and 8 have learnt to practice and utilise their many different literacy skills such as identifying themes and genres, writing PEEL paragraphs, and improving vocabulary using Tier 2 and 3 words.

Year 9 studied poetry, including war poems and other texts which discuss key social issues such as racial discrimination and stereotypes. They enjoyed their interaction with poetry as they were given the chance to explore their creativity by creating visual representations of their understanding. Students also studied 'Genre' in Film, and engaged with the interesting characters in texts in the unit 'Shakespeare's Villains'. Students and teachers have been involved in taking an exceptionally enriching journeys through the Ancient world, Middle Ages and Australia in the Modern world to its present. In doing so, the teaching and learning practise in HSIE subjects aimed to enrich the understanding of the world as it is. The use of Information Communications Technology (ICT) has progressively been integrated into teaching and learning programs across History, Geography, Commerce, and other Stage 6 subjects. It has been pleasing to know students and teachers alike are increasingly adopting key aspects of ICT in the learning process. The Moodle platform has facilitated a greater level of engagement in learning, which encourages a multimodal approach to problem solving, and developing literacy skills. The HSIE department as such will continue to adapt to changes.

Economics, Business Studies and Geography

Studies in Year 11 and 12 Business, Economics, and Geography engages students in developing their knowledge and skills about the Australian economy and the ways in which Australian businesses function and contribute to the economic wellbeing of Australians.

Students in Business Studies and Economics have actively engaged with the curriculum by applying changes in interest rates and inflation over 2021–2022 to their learning.



As the year comes to an end the TAS faculty wishes everyone a safe school holidays and wish our Year 12 students the very best in their future endeavours.


